## Made In Situ by Noé Duchaufour-Lawrance

In New York, meanwhile, Demisch Danant's new show highlights the work of French designer Noé Duchaufour-Lawrance. For the second consecutive year, the gallery presents a selection of pieces from Made In Situ, the designer's Paris and Lisbon-based project that advocates for a practice rooted in a given territory, exploring its materials, artisans, craftsmanship, and cultural vernacular. Developed alongside local artisans and craftspeople in each locale, the cross-disciplinary works are composed in an array of materials, including ceramics, wood, bronze, and beeswax. Made In Situ has its origins in the definition of the Latin expression in situ, a direct reference to the capacity of design to act as a vector, reconnecting us with our surroundings.
